

IOPC public interest disclosures 2024/25

The Independent Office for Police Conduct (IOPC) oversees the police complaints system in England and Wales, and investigates the most serious matters relating to police conduct. We also share our learning to improve police practices so that everyone can have trust and confidence in policing.

By law we are required to publish information about qualifying disclosures. A qualifying disclosure describes a situation in which a police officer or staff member passes on information, which they believe is in the public interest, that another police officer or staff member is doing, or is likely to do, something wrong or criminal. Number of qualifying disclosures where we took further action	93
Summary of action taken	For 80 disclosures, we asked for consent to forward the relevant information provided to the police force. Thirteen disclosures were passed to our Intelligence Unit. The unit assessed the information and liaised with other teams about whether any action should be taken. None of the disclosures resulted in us conducting an independent investigation.
